back for cups of tea when I start to inevitably lose it. Every single one of you is an asset to this place – never forgot that. It doesn't matter what your job title is – we are all human, and sharing that humanity with our patients and families is the best medicine of all.



Making a difference on our life journey

Many of you will recognise Anne who has just celebrated 50 years of nursing!

Having opened our doors just two years prior to her arrival, Anne has walked alongside and supported many families and whānau while they cared for their loved ones at the end of their life. With generous support from people like yourself, Anne has been part of the growth of the hospice in Hawke's Bay and talks about why she chose to work in this field of nursing.



"I began working at Cranford to help support our growing family but then grew to love this threshold nursing. Our patients and their families are on their life journey like any of us. They are secure in who they are, where they are going and their place in the family. Then the diagnosis that their life is limited with no cure available so often finds them on a dark, often frightening deviation where the future as they knew it has gone and the road signs seem to be in a foreign language.

Our task is to meet these ones

where they are, identify who they are, what can be done to help, and to accompany them and their families through this part of their journey.

Sometimes it's hard, sometimes it's easy. We cry, we laugh. Often a hug is all that is needed but then often the whole day is taken up with one person who needs special attention. When that happens, the wider team is focused together, working extremely hard to make a difference for that patient. It's such a great feeling when that is accomplished. On these days the whole team celebrates!


